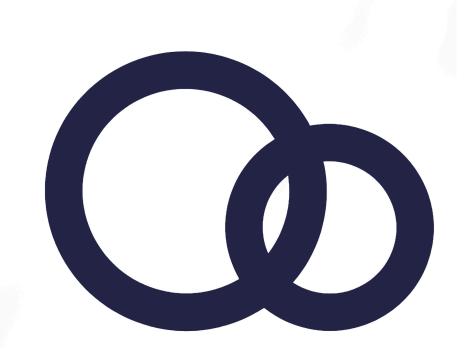

Are you ready to co-design?

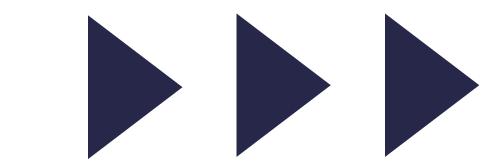
Your co-designers are the range of people involved and affected by the problem. They include **people who can influence change**, and **people who will benefit from a solution**.

Your co-design team

Do you have at least one person in your team who will be an ally for for children, young people and families?

Awareness

What big challenge is your project/organisation facing?

What can you do to meet this challenge?

What skills and responsibilities will you need in your co-design team? What do you need to meet the challenge? For example, will you need time, money, support or specific skills?

How will you know when you've succeeded? What will you see?

Mindset

How will you value different – and sometimes opposing – viewpoints?

How will you lead *learning through doing*— trying things out over just talking?

How will you elevate varied voices and contributions to make sure everyone is heard and holds some power? How will you encourage curiosity, so everyone stays open to various perspectives and experiences?

Approach

How will your co-designers best be able to participate? How will you incentivise them?

What is your ask for your co-designers?

Where will you talk about the challenge and work together? How can you make sure it's a safe space?

How will you ensure that seldom-heard voices are included?

Area of interest

What is the key thing you are trying to make better? Why is it important?

Who is this a problem for, and why are they affected?

What evidence do you have that this needs changing for people?

Can you reframe/reword this issue from a different perspective?

You hold the 'co' of co-design.

Your relationships are the heart of the solution.
